## Visiting bands refreshing change

Two bands, The Waitresses and Tracterz performed in the Nebraska Union Sunday night to start Homecoming Week with a big bang.

Tracterz, a five-piece band, put on a high energy performance which included recent hits from groups such as the B-52s and Missing Persons. Their cover songs were excellent but they also sprinkled their performance with some of their own songs.

They did some old songs, too, but with a new-wavish twist.

Patty Donahue, lead singer of the Waitresses, was the star of the show. She and the four other group members performed songs from their new album, *Bruseology*, as well as their first LP, *Wasn't Tomorrow Wonderful?*

One of their encore songs was last year's seasonal hit, "Christmas Wrapping," which was well received by the crowd. They also performed their new single, "Make the Weather."

The Waitresses came to Lincoln as part of their national tour to promote *Bruseology*. They were a refreshing change from other groups who usually

## Chamber orchestra delights Lincoln

The Paillard Chamber Orchestra treated Lincoln to a 300-year trip back in music history on Sunday night. The orchestra, founded and hand-picked by French conductor and musicologist Jean-Francois Paillard in 1953, played works from the 17th to 20th centuries at Kimball Recital Hall.

The 13-member ensemble plays a series of 30 concerts a year, subsidized by the French government, and performs in more than 70 festivals and concert halls in Europe, America and Asia.

A chamber orchestra is smaller than a full orchestra. Beige flats with partial roofs enclosed the Paillard in an appropriately intimate space on the Kimball stage.

"French Suite in G Minor," by Jean-Baptiste Lully featured the clavichord (a piano-like instrument) and included some quite danceable baroque passages, but was not nearly so lively as the Jean Joseph Mouret piece, "Premiere suite de Simphonies in D Major," featuring Guy Touvron as piccolo trumpet soloist.

When Touvron sounded the first notes of the *allegro*, a warm chuckle for the theme music of PBS' *Masterpiece Theater* spread through the audience. The chuckle began a flirtation that became a full-flowered love affair between the Kimball crowd and the Dudley Moore-like imp on stage.

"Concert Pieces for Cello and Orchestra," by Francois Couperin featured Carlos Dourthe as cello soloist. The piece was a decided change of pace and offered a number of maudlin, almost dirge-like passages.

The Richard Strauss "Capriccio for String Orchestra" was predictably full of waltz music and presented Gerald Jarry as violin soloist for the long and ponderous piece.

Touvron returned for "Sonata for Trumpet and Strings," by Georg-Philip Telemann. He was, if possible, even more responsive to the music than in his first appearance. The audience showed their appreciation by calling him back for four encores, a considerable number even for the Paillard which takes a certain call after each piece.

After the fourth encore, Touvron played some phrases from Rossini's "The Barber of Seville" on the trumpet and was called back for yet another bow.
