ASUN studies effectiveness of UNL academic advising

The effectiveness of academic advising currently is the topic of study for **ASUN** academic policies committee.

At the senate's weekly meeting Wed-nesday, Sen. John Valdrighi said sur-veys about advising have been distributed to most deans. UNL advising procedures are coordinated either by colleges or by departments within each college, he said.

"It's a pretty diversified thing to study," Valdrighi said. "We don't know if there's even a problem with academic advising. We just want to know how we could evaluate it."


An ASUN newsletter will be distributed on campus next week, said Second Vice President Regina Rogers.

ASUN plans to have copies of the newsletter in time for their open house meeting with the NU Board of Regents, vice-chancellors and other administrators this afternoon, Rogers said.

"We'll meet strictly as an advisory committee . . . and give our results to the chancellor."
