Turnovers abound as Nebraska freshmen whip Waldorf JC

Nebraska's freshman defense forced four fumbles and three interceptions and the offense ground 421 yards on the ground as they defeated Waldort Junior College 27-0 in their final home football game Friday.

Both teams had difficulty hanging on to the ball in the cold, wet weather. Nebraska turned the ball over four times losing three of seven fumbles and one interception.

"With the wet field, we were limited with our offense," freshman coach Dan Young said. "We ran straight at them pretty good."

Nebraska wingback Von Sheppard opened the scoring after he took a Waldorf punt on his own 6-yard line and returned it 94 yards for a touchdown with 9:54 left in the first quarter. On the day, Sheppard returned five punts for 114 yards.

"Sheppard has good broken-field running ability,"
Young said.

Three of Nebraska's turnovers came in the first quarter. Novell Jackson fumbled after gains of 14 and 12 yards the first two times Nebraska had the ball. Young said Jackson wasn't getting a grip on the ball because his forearms were taped. After taking off the tape, he didn't have any more trouble, and led all rushers with 81 yards on 11 carries.

On the Huskers' third possession, Jeff Taylor threw an interception, but on Nebraska's fourth possession, Taylor and McCathorn Clayton combined to engineer an eight-play, 63-yard scoring drive. Clayton ran 17 yards for Nebraska's second touchdown with 13 minutes left in the second quarter, putting NU ahead 13-0.

The freshman defense twice held Waldorf out of the end zone inside the Husker 10-yard line. Late in the second quarter, Waldorf had a second and goal at the Husker seven when linebacker Kevin Parsons forced a fumble, and defensive end Jeff Jamrog recovered.

Late in the third quarter, Waldorf had a first down at the Husker six when defensive end Brad Tryer recovered a fumble at the 10. Nebrasks then drove 90 yards in eight plays, with quarterback Henley Hawkins scoring on a 46-yard run with 13:47 left in the game.

Young said the defense put forth a good effort and that he was encouraged by their progress. The offense still lacks consistency, he said. Nebraska accumulated 434 yards of offense, but only 13 yards came from passing, on two completions in 16 attempts.

Nebraska scored late in the fourth quarter on Clayton's one-yard run with 3:10 remaining. The final touchdown drive covered 53 yards in eight plays.

The Huskers will play their final game next Friday when they travel to Lawrence, Ran. to meet the Kansas junior varsity team.
