First strike.

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Morland said first strike land based missiles like the MX are buried in hardened silos that can only be destroyed by the "crater effect" of an attacking

He said an attacking missile can leave a hole the size of Memorial Stadium and could wipe out an area at least as big as the states of Nebraska and Iowa with radioactive fallout. If the missile silo isn't impacted, the rest of the destruction is wasted, he

Once a nuclear attack is launched a counter attack is the obvious response, he said the only way to "win" is to coerce the other side into stopping. To do this, a country must be able to increase missile retaliation until the enemy is unable to respond.

Morland said he thinks this is impossible.

It would take at least thirty years to stop the arms race, he said, because we live in a society where the major thrust of history has been toward war.

"We'll never forget how to make nuclear weapons," Morland said. "We must create institutions to control
