Rozier broke the single season rushing touch-down record of 26 set by Penn State's Lydell Mitchell in 1971 and his 28 touchdowns is just one shy of the NCAA mark of 29 in one season, also set by Mitchell in 1971.

He broke one of Nebraska's oldest records Saturday as he raised his season scoring total to 168 to break the record set by Bobby Reynolds in 1950. Nebraska's record-setting senior has almost com-

pletely overshadowed his teammates, but they aren't worried about it.

"I think he's got it (the Heisman Trophy) sewn up," Fryar said. "There's no doubt about it."

Turner Gill said the whole offensive team feels a part of Rozier's records, but admitted that Rozier is the man who should merit some special recognition.

"Mike is a great person, a great running back and he's got a great future ahead of him," Gill said.

## Orange Bowl ticket sale begins Nov. 28

UNL students can purchase tickets for the Jan. 2 Orange Bowl in Miami, beginning Nov. 28 in a special sale at the UNL Athletic Ticket Office, South Stadium 117.

Jean Walcott of the ticket office said the sale will be similar to the Oklahoma ticket sale. Nebraska's 2,500 student tickets will be divided into three parts to sell equal amounts during the three days. The sale will begin at 9 a.m. each day, and continue until 4 p.m. or until that day's allotment has been sold out.

The tickets cost \$20. Groups will be limited to six students, and each person in that group must purchase his or her own ticket at the same time with the rest of the group.

## Husker wrestlers come out on top in match despite two injuries

Nebraska's wrestlers sent their opponents tumbling at the Bison Open in Fargo, N.D., Saturday. The Huskers placed a wrestler in the top six of every weight division but one, and won the "unofficial" team title.

The word "unofficial" is used because team scores were not recorded. If they had been, Nebraska would have probably won their third consecutive open according to Coach Bob Fehrs.

Nebraska suffered two setbacks, though, 118-pounder Matt Campbell and 177-pounder Jim Scherr suffered injuries that may keep them out of this weekend's dual with Big Eight opponent Oklahoma State.

Campbell's ankle was severely strained, forcing him to default to a sixth place finish after he had made it to the semi-finals.

Scherr broke his cheekbone in the first 10 seconds of his finals match, but still finished and won his match 3-2.

"If they are unable to wrestle, it will serve as a detrimental effect to the team — reducing our capabilities considerably," Fehrs said.

He added the wrestling staff should know by Wednesday or Thursday if the two will be able to wrestle this weekend.

Despite the injuries, Fehrs said the tournament provided a chance for his team to wrestle several matches and give them experience in match competition.

Bill Scheer, 190-pounder, also won his division. Heavyweight Gary Albright finished second, losing to a United States World team member in the finals, and Gill Sanchez (126) and Chris Marisette (134) finished second, both losing to championship caliber wrestlers, Fehrs said.

"The competition was better than it has been in recent years," Fehrs said.

Third place finishers included Dave Evans (142) and William Taylor (150), while Eric Taylor (158) wound up sixth. Nebraska failed to place anybody in the 167 pound weight class.

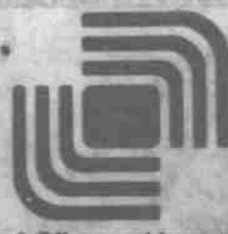
