One minute Rip is spewing oral bilge, and the next he is waxing poetic about the sweet divine mysteries of electricity. In addition, the semi-spontaneous burst of ping-pong word association between Brandy and Stan oozed. Unlikely dialogue made for unlikely characters. To the actors' credit, the play was enjoyable in

several scenes because of the earnest and consistent effort at characterization, within the limits of the script, Director Robert Esquivel made excellent use of available space in the Spigot. His blocking showed the possibilities of creative use of bathroom space.

Technically, the pace picked up during the six sketchy scenes of the second act, but the continuity was trashed by loud and obnoxious scene changes. Not only did the stage hands drop props, but the sound people obviously were sado-masochists: they cranked scratchy renditions of "You Always Hurt the One You Love" and "Shock the Monkey" - Auf Deautsche, to be sneaky - between scenes.

Stagestruck may add a needed dimension to theater in Lincoln if they continue to try experimental works. The talent of the actors and director involved still made for a not unpleasant evening. Their efforts were merely strangled by a pretentious, misfired script.
