# Health Center begins search for student health aides

The University Health Center is looking for a few healthy people for the 1984-1985 academic year.

Recruitment now is taking place for health aides, students who live on campus and link students and the health center, said program supervisor Janet Crawford.

"Health aides provide first-aid to people in the living unit," Crawford said. "They treat some kinds of scaleddown illnesses and have a health kit. They also provide health information."

While serving as health aides, stu-dents take a Public Health class for college credit, said program supervisor Margaret Pavelka.

Besides the class, health aides are expected to be certified in both cardiopulmonary resuscitation and in first aid, Pavelka said. The Health Center helps enroll the student in certifi-

Some health aide activities include writing a health tip each semester, doing a project involving health, helping with Wellness Week, providing information and refering students to the Health Center when appropriate, Crawford said. They submit weekly reports to the supervisor.

Health aides receive \$8 a week. The public health course books are loaned to the students by the Health Center.

The grade for the class is based on work done outside of class, such as the health tips. The activities have point values, which are computed with the class and exam grade to get the final grade, Pavelka said.

Application packets can be picked up in 106 University Health Center or from a health aide.

There are approximately 130 positions available, Crawford said.


