## You're the quarterback at the hall of fame

KINGS' MILL, Ohio — Monday-morning quarterbacks and frustrated placekickers have the opportunity to test their skills here at the College Football Hall of Fame and Museum.

Visitors can match strategy in key situations, with the game's coaching legends in their most important games, via a computer.

Or they can boot the game-winning field goal through the uprights as the crowd roars.

For the more trivial-minded, their knowledge of the gridiron can be tested with a computer quiz. Which team ended Oklahoma's 47-game winning streak in the Fifties? (Notre Dame) How high is the crossbar of a goalpost? (10 feet)

Speaking of the Fighting Irish, one may even kibbutz in the Notre Dame locker room while Coach Knute Rockne gives his famous "Gipper" speech.

There is too much to see and do in an afternoon's visit to the hall of fame, which is operated by the National Football Foundation. Housed in a two-story Colonial-style building northeast of Cincinnati on Interstate 71, the hall recognizes football greats of the past.

Rockne, Bear Bryant, Tom Harmon and Supreme Court Justice Byron "Whizzer" White are enshrined here. So are Bob Devaney, Johnny Rodgers, Sam Francis, Ed Weir, Guy Chamberlain and other Nebraska players and coaches. Bobby Reynolds will be inducted this December.

Even Fielding "Hurry-Up" Yost, who coached the Nebraska Bugeaters for one season before departing for greater fame at Michigan is a hall inductee.

The building's atrium is dominated by larger-than-life cutouts of Rodgers, shown breaking away from a Colorado

defender, and former Omaha Central High School and Kansas great Gale Sayers, among others, hanging from the ceiling.

Other displays depict the campus soda shop (where refreshments are sold during the tourist season) and a 1920-vintage press box where famous sportswriter Grantland Rice could have pounded out his immortal story of Notre Dame's Four Horsemen.

The "Time Tunnel" traces football's evolution through the past 3,000 years. The exhibit's winding path is lined up with sketches, dioramas, photographs and displays.

Many of the hall's inductees are spotlighted, including Pudge Hefflinger of Yale, Amos Alonzo Stagg of Chicago, John Heisman of Georgia Tech and Doc Blanchard and Glenn Davis of Army.

Replicas of a student's dorm rooms in the 1890s, with beer steins and hurricane lamps, and in the 1940s, with pinups and movie posters add unexpected flavor to the exhibit.

Upstairs, the Outland, Lombardi and MacArthur Bowl trophies are displayed in the entry hall.

Detracting from the hall's prestige, however, is the "Flip of the Coin" game room, featuring the latest in video arcade games. Ironically, it failed to have the popular four-player football video game found in Lincoln arcades.

On the museum grounds are a 20,000-seat stadium that is used for the NCAA's Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl each December and a "Walk of Champions", with outstanding high school teams and coaches recognized by concrete plaques.

The museum is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily. Admission is \$3.75 for adults.
