Motocross..

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The sport is filled with people from 5-years-old to more than 30-years-old, although most of the racers are high school age. Antinoro began racing at the "late" age of 14 on a 80cc motorcycle, more commonly known as a minibike. He raced in the minibike division for two years, and this year sold his bike and went to a bigger size, the Kawasaki 125cc.

He enjoyed success in racing the last two years. His room is filled with trophies ranging from fourth to first place finishes in area races. Last year he raced in the highest division locally (Nebraska, Kansas, Missouri, etc.) in minibike racing, mini-expert, and he qualified for the National Motocross Association's finals in the novice division in Ponca City,

Okla., by winning his region. Antinoro has again qualified for NMA competition this year in the novice 125cc class.

Antinoro could have raced in the minibike division again this year with one year of eligibility left, but decided to move up a class.

"I only had one more year left and I probably would have raced B (intermediate) at nationals, but it really wasn't going to get me anywhere," he said. "You get a lot more recognition on a motorcycle."

"I want to see how good I can get, and how fast I can get," he said.

Antinoro attributes his success to his dedication. He said it is common knowledge among bikers that racing is 80 percent rider and 20 percent motorcycle. He said he takes pride in the fact that he has earned the repsect of the older riders. At age 16, he is riding against people in their early and mid-20s as well as people his own age.

"I'm one of the youngest in my class and they respect me," he said. "It makes me feel good if I can get them psyched out a little bit."

He becomes angry when he sees people who have talent, not only in motocross but in other sports, but waste it by not taking it seriously and partying too much.

"If you train hard, you'll have a lot of success. But you could have all the talent in the world, but if you don't work for it...you know," Antinoro said. "If I was on a football team, I would want to be a star."

Antinoro said he enjoys partying just as much as the next guy. But, he said, he knows he would be cheating himself if he didn't take full advantage of his capabilities.

Antinoro works part time at a grocery store and said that \$60 of his paycheck goes toward his motorcycle every week. The money is used for bike equipment, entry fees, and other miscellaneous items.

Antinoro's apparrel as well as his motorcycle advertises for Kawasaki. Right now Antinoro pays for his own equipment, but he said that soon Kawasaki may sponsor him. To earn the endorsement, he said, he has to prove himself as a rider and as a

Because motocross is unpredictable, especially when he is on the back tire of a bike going more than 50 mph, Antinoro's equipment is mostly protective clothing.

"You have to just trust them," Antinoro said. "People fall, and I've run over people."

He related a case at nationals where a competitor in front of him wrecked his bike going over a jump. "There was nothing I could do," he said, "He was in the way and if I could have went around him I would
