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
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# Appetizers pep up school bashes

Guacamole

2 medium avocados, peeled and seeded 2 medium tomatoes, peeled and coarsely chopped

4 cup chopped onion

2 tablespoons lemon juice 4 cup chopped green chiles

salt, pepper


make it." Wirst, a trombonist from Lincoln East, said she has aimed at a spot in the UNL section since the sixth grade, but she didn't really feel very nervous either.
