

Driving competition tests students' skills



Any full-time college or university student is eligible to compete in the championships, except employees of sponsorship affiliates and members of sanctioning bodies.

During the 1984-85 school year, students from more than 100 major universities are expected to participate. In the first four weeks, the championships will go to 18 schools in Michigan, Iowa, Indiana, Kansas, Illinois, Nebraska, Ohio and Colorado. In all, 36 states will be covered by the event.

The competition, endorsed and supported by the National Highway Traffic Administration and the National Safety Council, promotes safe driving habits in young drivers. Throughout the event, students learn about safe driving, as well as the importance of the use of safety restraint systems Campus winners will compete against each other at the National Grand Final in Daytona Beach, Fla., during the annual college spring break.

Before the finals, "open" competitions will be in Daytona Beach and Ft. Lauderdale, Fla. and South Padre Island, Tex. There, the competition will be open to any eligible college student who has not already competed. Winners in these weekly "opens" will compete in the Grand Finals at Daytona Beach.

First prize at the Grand Final is a \$5,000 scholarship and the use of a Dodge Daytona Turbo Z for one year; second place, a \$3,000 scholarship and the use of a Dodge Daytona Turbo Z for one year; third place, a \$2,000 scholarship and the use of a Dodge Daytona Turbo Z for a year.
