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Red Skelton delighted a near sell out crowd with a two hour performance Monday night at the Bob Devaney Sports Center. Preferring to be called a clown rather than a comedian, Skelton relied on jokes, expressions and pantomimes for his heart-warming performance. His humor was light-hearted, and he often laughed at his own jokes before the audience could.
