Proposal called 'unnecessary'

Republicans vote against land valuation amendment

After hearing presentations for and against, people attending the Lancaster County Republican Party's committee meeting Thursday night voted 19-10 against a proposed agricultural land valuation amendment.

The public was invited to the meeting, which was designed to simplify the Amendment No. 4 issue, but committee members and other prominent Republicans mainly comprised the crowd.

The vote, an unofficial straw tions. poll, does not necessarily reflect the position of the county party.

The amendment was drafted in response to a January Nebraska Supreme Court decision which held that assessing agricultural land significantly lower than residential and commercial property violates state law. To comply with that ruling, agricultural land valuations would have to be drastically increased or the constitution changed.

Bryce Neidig, president of the Nebraska Farm Bureau Federation, spoke for the amendment, stressing that its passage would not automatically change valua-

Agricultural land valuations will is passed or not, Neidig said, but state tax system. Amendment No. 4 could be "more fair to farmers."

"This is not a tax break for

agriculture," he said.

Charles Bacon of the Nebraska Tax Research Council sid the amendment is unnecessary because the state has worked around the unconstitutionality of uneven tax valuations.

"It would just legalize some-117 years," Bacon said.
