Envoy favors disarmam

"We don't need more nuclear weapons in Europe, we need less nuclear weapons in Europe," the Swedish Ambassador Count Wilhelm Wachtmeister said.

Wachtmeister said Sweden's position of neutrality allows it to view disarmament and other East/West problems with more detachment than countries aligned on either side.

Wachtmeister said it does not




