

Poll shows Reagan, Exon, GOP are favorites

An overwhelming majority of UNL students polled by the Daily Nebraskan said they would vote for President Ronald Reagan in the Nov. 6 election.

In a random student opinion

poll conducted Oct. 19 to 24, 70.7 percent of 150 registered respondents said they support Reagan. About 19 percent supported Walter Mondale, while 3.3 percent favored alternative party candidates.

Of 200 students polled, 150 were registered voters -- 78

male, 72 female. Students' phone numbers were randomly selected from a compiled list of all UNL students' phone numbers. Calling was done at varied times to ensure against a time bias in the poll.

Poll results for national races are tabulated below, in total and by sex.
