"Before the game, we were hoping to come out of the first quar-ter with a tie," Osborne said to those attending the Extra Point club luncheon at Miller and Paine. Osborne said he was concerned

with the Jayhawks because they came out with confidence and momentum after their victory over Oklahoma. He said he was worried about getting upset and looking ahead to Oklahoma.

Osborne said freshman split end Jason Gamble was the only major injury in the Kansas game. Gamble had arthoscopic surgery Sunday and his status for any post-season play will be determined in the coming weeks. Junior fullback Tom Rathman came out of the game with a sore shoulder, and defensive ends Scott Strasburger and Brad Smith, and linebacker Steve Forch left Saturday's game with sore necks. All three are expected to be ready for Saturday's game with the Sooners.
