She nudges her blonde teen-age  
daughter, shakes her head up  
and down and tilts with laugh-  
ter when she thinks I'm not looking. I  
am. I pay for my groceries and jeans.  
I talk to God on the way home.  
"Can't you at least tell my why?" I  
ask. The question sticks in my throat.  
"What do I say in response? How do I  
tell them? I don't even understand  
it."

At home I get dressed, put the food  
away and leave immediately for a  
friend's wedding. The wedding is  
beautiful. I shake all the way through  
the service. I hope I didn't bother the  
people sitting behind me. I'm sure I  
did.

And then the reception. All of my  
friends are there. It's a battle to keep  
my head still. I go to the bathroom if  
I can't control my shaking. Some-  
times I don't make it.

One of my friends makes a com-  
ment on my head motions — the only  
comment of the night. "I wondered  
who that was in line ahead of us hug-

ging Mrs. Jamison. Then I saw you  
flip your hair, and I knew it had to be  
you, Jim."

I smile, sip my coffee, and say,  
"That's me all right." I laugh ner-  
vously. I'm very uncomfortable. I want  
to pour my coffee down the front of  
her dress.

You think I like doing this? You  
think it's funny? Is something. You  
do this all your God-damned life with-  
out ever knowing why, and yet see  
how you like it. You don't know. You  
don't know. How dare you look at  
me. Go to hell. I smile and say  
nothing.

Finally it's over. I'm home. It all  
comes out. The frustration, the anger,  
the hate, the confusion. I rest my  
head on Susan's shoulder, and cry in  
her strawberry-blonde hair. I shake,  
shake and shake some more.

Suddenly I can't control my anger.  
"This isn't fair, God damnit; I don't  
deserve this. I don't want this any-  
more." I get up. I bury my fist into  
our bedroom door. A 3-inch hole  
marks my anger. Now Susan is crying.

I reorganize and we huddle together,  
crying and comforting each other. I  
cover the hole with a Catfield poster  
that had previously hung on the wall.

I can't stop shaking. "Dear Lord,  
help me. I don't want to shake any-  
more." I crawl under the covers and  
go to sleep.

Since writing this story I've  
received very good news.  
Indeed, a neurologist has  
diagnosed me as having a form of  
Tourette's Syndrome, a little-  
known neurological disorder  
caused by a chemical imbalance  
in the brain. That's why my head  
shakes. It's a medical problem.  
There is no panacea, no guarantee,  
but through medication and con-  
tinuing research, there is a  
chance — a good chance — that I  
may yet live a symptom-free life. It  
is a chance that I never believed  
existed for me. Someone heard my  
prayer.

## Legislature Briefs

● Following Gov. Bob Kerrey's  
request, 20 senators introduced a  
resolution calling for the state to  
settle the Commonwealth Savings Co.  
claim with a \$20.5 million appropri-  
ation.

Kerrey last Wednesday asked the  
lawmakers to draft a resolution of  
intent pledging any dollar figure  
they saw fit to start the bargaining  
process between depositors and the  
Legislature. He suggested the \$20.5  
million in a plan he presented  
Tuesday.

LR39 is scheduled for floor debate  
today at 9:30 a.m. If senators approve  
the measure, it will move to Lancas-  
ter County District Court, which  
must assess the legality of the set-  
tlement. Eighty percent of the de-  
positors must give their approval to  
the plan once it emerges from court.  
The resolution states that it is in  
the best interest of the state to re-  
store the public's confidence in fi-  
nancial institutions. Sen. John  
DeCamp of Neligh, one of the spon-  
sors, has said that repaying deposi-  
tors will do that.

● Sen. Daniel Lynch of Omaha  
is one step ahead of minors who  
think they can fool bouncers if iden-  
tification photographs are dropped  
from driver's licenses. He has intro-  
duced a bill which would require  
the licenses of minors to be printed  
on different colored paper from that  
used for adults. Earlier in the ses-  
sion Lynch introduced LR92, a mea-  
sure that would remove the photo-  
graphs. The Department of Motor  
Vehicles has indicated that tight  
funding may force eliminating the  
pictures regardless of the bills'  
outcome.
