The state took legal action against the school leaders, "but the state wasn't a victim. There was no cause for action," Sileven said. He said law enforcement officials should have had the right to disobey a court order to shut down his church school.

The officials gave "an oath to uphold the Constitution," Sileven said. He likened obedience to "unconstitutional" orders to the obedience of Nazi war criminals to their superiors.

The United States' founders gave authority to state and federal governments, but they did not "set up rulers over themselves," Sileven said.

The founding fathers didn't set up a true democracy either, he said.

"They feared democracy, more than any other form of government," even dictatorship, he said.

Sileven cited polls that showed 80 to 90 percent of Nebraskans think Sileven's Christian school should not run without accredited teachers.

"My response would be that we are not a democracy, and the people of the United States do not have the authority to vote away" individual rights, he said.

Parents choose to send their children to private schools, Sileven said. If children who attend unaccredited schools are proven to be academically behind students of public schools, then the state should find the parents guilty of negligence, he said.

But until this proof is shown, Sileven said, the schools should not be closed. And private school leaders should not be punished for breaking a law to prevent poor education.

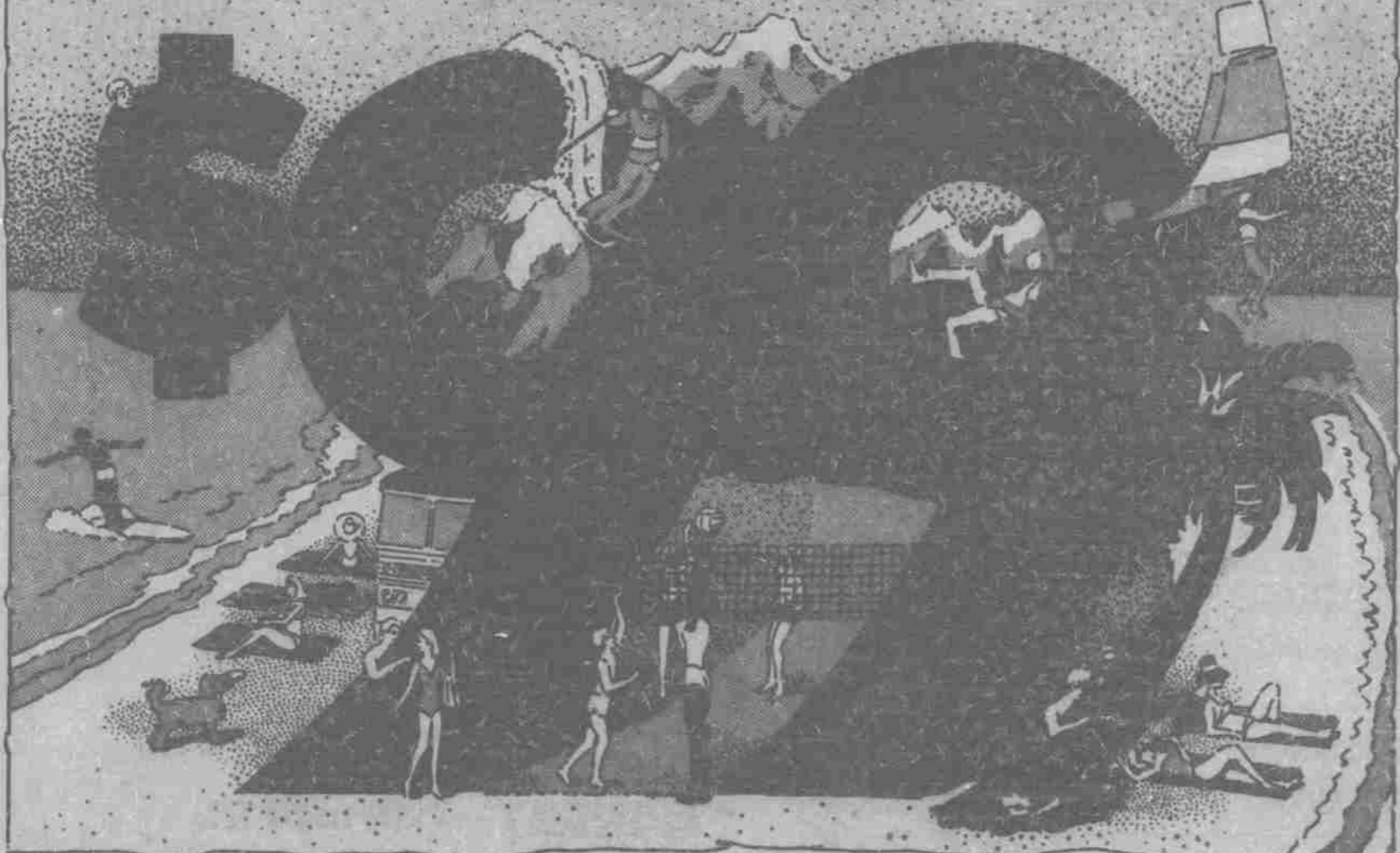

\$1.4 million given to UNL in January

UNL received more than \$1.4 million in outside support in January, according to a report from Earl Freise, vice chancellor for research.

The money was given to the following departments:

- research programs, \$1.2 million;
- instructional programs, nearly \$128,000;
- public service programs, nearly \$78,500;
- student aid, \$37,500.

Federal agencies donated the most money to UNL — nearly \$951,000. State support totaled more than \$224,000. Local agencies donated more than \$4,000, industry more than \$176,000 and the NU Foundation \$2,000. Other agencies provided nearly \$89,000.

UNL has received nearly \$14 million during fiscal 1984-85.
