"Students can concentrate on one or two courses rather than spreading themselves across five or six," Small said.

UNL offers four summer sessions:

- pre-session May 20 to June 7;
- eight-week session, May 20 to July 12, primarily geared toward upperclassmen and graduate students working on major projects, master theses or dissertations;
- two five-week sessions from June 10 to July 12 and July 15 to August 16.

The two five-week sessions are the most popular, Small said.

"The student also has better access to the professor during the summer," he said. Most classes are concentrated and meet five days a week for an extended period, helping a special student-professor relationship develop.

Much of the social hoopla that surrounds the regular academic year — sports, parties and other distractions — is not present during the summer. Small said this is an advantage because "the student has less to contend with and can spend more time on academics."

But summer sessions are not all work and no play. The session program provides activities such as last year's classic comedy films in the Nebraska Union. They will be shown again in 1985, along with several films at the Sheldon Film Theatre and an opera in Howell Theatre.

Campus Recreation organizes trips and intramural sports.

Workshops ranging from "Food Preservation: The Inside Story" to "Story Telling and Creative Drama" also are slated for the 1985 summer sessions. Most are available for credit and many are 400- and graduate-level courses.

"The biggest advantage to enrolling in summer session is that graduation can be sped up," Small said. Students can do one semester work by taking three credits in the pre-session and six in each five-week session.

Early registration for summer sessions is March 18 to April 5. Beginning March 13, students can pick up registration packets from the Information Window, Administration Building 208 and 209 or Agricultural Hall 109 on East Campus.

Foreign leaders and ministers are expected to gather in Moscow on Wednesday for the funeral, which will give them a chance to size up the new leader, the seventh in the Soviet Union's 67 years. Vice President George Bush and Secretary of State George Shultz will head the U.S. delegation.

Muscovites seemed little moved by the death of Chernenko. They gathered

in groups in Red Square as workmen began construction for the funeral.

One middle-aged woman elbowing her way through Gorky Street said of Gorbachev: "What difference does it make to me? I still have to feed my family."

The Kremlin mood also appeared to be strictly "business as usual" despite the three days of mourning.
