## LOOK

The Look Party hopes to become the "elected voice of the UNL student body" when Wednesday's ASUN election results are announced.

Look Party president Tim Burke, a junior advertising major, first vice presidential candidate Eric Lane, a sophomore psychology and English major, and second vice presidential candidate Phil Tatro, a sophomore broadcasting major, said they'd like UNL students to "take a closer look" at what ASUN can do. Some party stands:

**ASUN'S ROLE:** Look candidates said ASUN should serve as a liaison between the NU Board of Regents, faculty and the student body and be "the elected voice of the student body, of the students, for the student."

**PARTY PLATFORM:** Look candidates say they plan to "re-educate the student body to create a vocal awareness of the student government" and continue to inform the student body on the direct and indirect resources that influence the strength and growth of the university and the student body.

**PROPOSALS AND CHANGES:** Look proposes improving communication by reorganizing the internal structure of ASUN and encouraging student participation to end apathy.

Target Party candidates say they will take a "strong, enthusiastic approach" into Wednesday's ASUN elections. Presidential candidate Gerard Keating, a junior agribusiness major, first vice presidential candidate Rod Penner, a sophomore ag honors major, and Jeff Fishback, second vice presidential candidate, a junior integrated studies for international management major, said they will "provide insight to student needs and not just react" to them. Some party stands:

**ASUN'S ROLE:** Target candidates define ASUN as an "elected body of representatives who work for the concerns of all students at the university." To make ASUN more visible, Target candidates have emphasized that ASUN "must work to maintain itself as a representative organization of trust and stability for all students."

**PARTY PLATFORM:** Target candidates said they will use their "aggressive leadership to strengthen ASUN visibility, meet the students' needs through broadening communication and advising between faculty and students." Target candidates emphasized representing all students on campus and addressing issues that affect all students.

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## CHANGE

Members of the Change Party say they're hoping their experience and other qualifications will lead them to victory in Wednesday's ASUN elections. Presidential candidate Kevin Goldstein, a senior business major, first vice presidential candidate Jill Fager, a sophomore nursing major, and second vice presidential candidate Doug Kasparek, a sophomore secondary education major, said they will offer a "more diverse, more representative ASUN." Some party stands:

**ASUN'S ROLE:** ASUN should be a "union of students which is as strong as its members make it." It should "provide legitimate services to students and should serve as an advocate of students' rights." The greatest power ASUN has, according to Change party members, is its "voice."

**PLATFORM:** Advancing the rights of students and allowing students to determine student policy "wherever and whenever possible." Greater student input into monetary decisions, including capital construction at UNL.

**PARTY PROPOSALS AND CHANGES:** A 20/15 proposal that would combine the current method of ASUN elections by colleges with an election by living units. In addition to the normal election process, five students would be elected from off-campus residency, five from residence halls and five from fraternity and sorority houses.

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## 'Joke parties' not kidding about candidacy

Sometimes ASUN "joke parties" don't necessarily end up a joke as is the case with this year's three unofficial parties — SCUM, STUPID, and TURD.

SCUM presidential candidate Jon Johnston, a fifth-year undeclared senior, said SCUM is an

acronym standing for Students Coalition to Undermine Morality.

The party would like to "strip ASUN of its funds and create scholarships for financially needy students," he said.

In a letter to the Daily Nebraskan, STUPID

presidential candidate Jay Noble, a senior advertising major, said he opposes construction of the UNL Recreation Center because he feels any construction "would eliminate current outdoor rec facilities that could not be replaced."

Noble said he supports a climate control sys-

tem for Morrill Hall, increased on-campus security such as better lighting and the construction of a faculty/staff parking garage. The garage would open up parking stalls to students presently used by faculty members.

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
