



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The Reuter News Report BOSTON - Smokeless tobacco, which is becoming more popular among young people, causes high blood pres-sure, according to two Ohio State University researchers in a recent New England Journal of Medicine article.

In a survey of 1,663 volunteers, the 19 young men who used chewing tobacco and snull had blood pressure readings that were significantly higher than those for both smokers and non-smokers.

Besides being addictive and causing cancer, "smokeless tobacco use appears to be associated with higher blood pressure levels in young adulta," concluded K. L. Schroeder and M. S. Chen.

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
