ASUN's Government Liaison Committee is conducting a letter-writing campaign this week to protest cuts in student financial aid and the state Legislature's 1.6 percent budget increase for NU.

GLC will have a booth inside the north entrance of the Nebraska Union from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. today through Thursday, where UNL students can write letters to state and national representatives. Today and Tuesday the GLC will concentrate on getting students to write letters to state legislators. Wednesday and Thursday the committee will work on student letters to Nebraska representatives in Washington.

The GLC will provide stationery and will mail the letters for UNL students.

"Women, Alcohol and Pregnancy," an all-day seminar sponsored by the Lincoln Council on Alcoholism and Drugs, will be today from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education, 33rd and Holdrege streets.

Dr. LeClair Bissell will discuss how to identify chemical dependency in women and the prevention of fetal alcohol effects/syndrome.

Other regional experts who will speak at the seminar include Dr. Ann Olney, a fellow in Clinical Genetics at the NU Medical Center in Omaha, and Mike Munday, director of the Children from Alcoholic Families Program in Lincoln. Jennife Grace, senior professional alcoholism counselor, will moderate a panel focusing on women's issues in chemical dependency.

Safety and environmental hazards associated with the practice of chemigation, the application of agricultural chemicals through an irrigation system, will be the focus of a two-day national conference Tuesday and Wednesday at UNL's Center for Continuing Education, 33rd and Holdrege streets.

The conference is being presented by the Cooperative Extension Service of the university's Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources under terms of a U.S. Department of Agriculture grant.

DeLynn Hay, extension agricultural engineering specialist, and John Witkowski, extension entomologist at the university's Northeast Research and Extension Center, are coordinating arrangements for the conference.

According to Hay and Witkowski, the conference should be of particular interest to chemigation researchers, irrigation equipment manufacturers, agricultural chemical companies, governmental regulatory agencies, extension specialists, agricultural consultants and representatives of water or natural resources agencies.

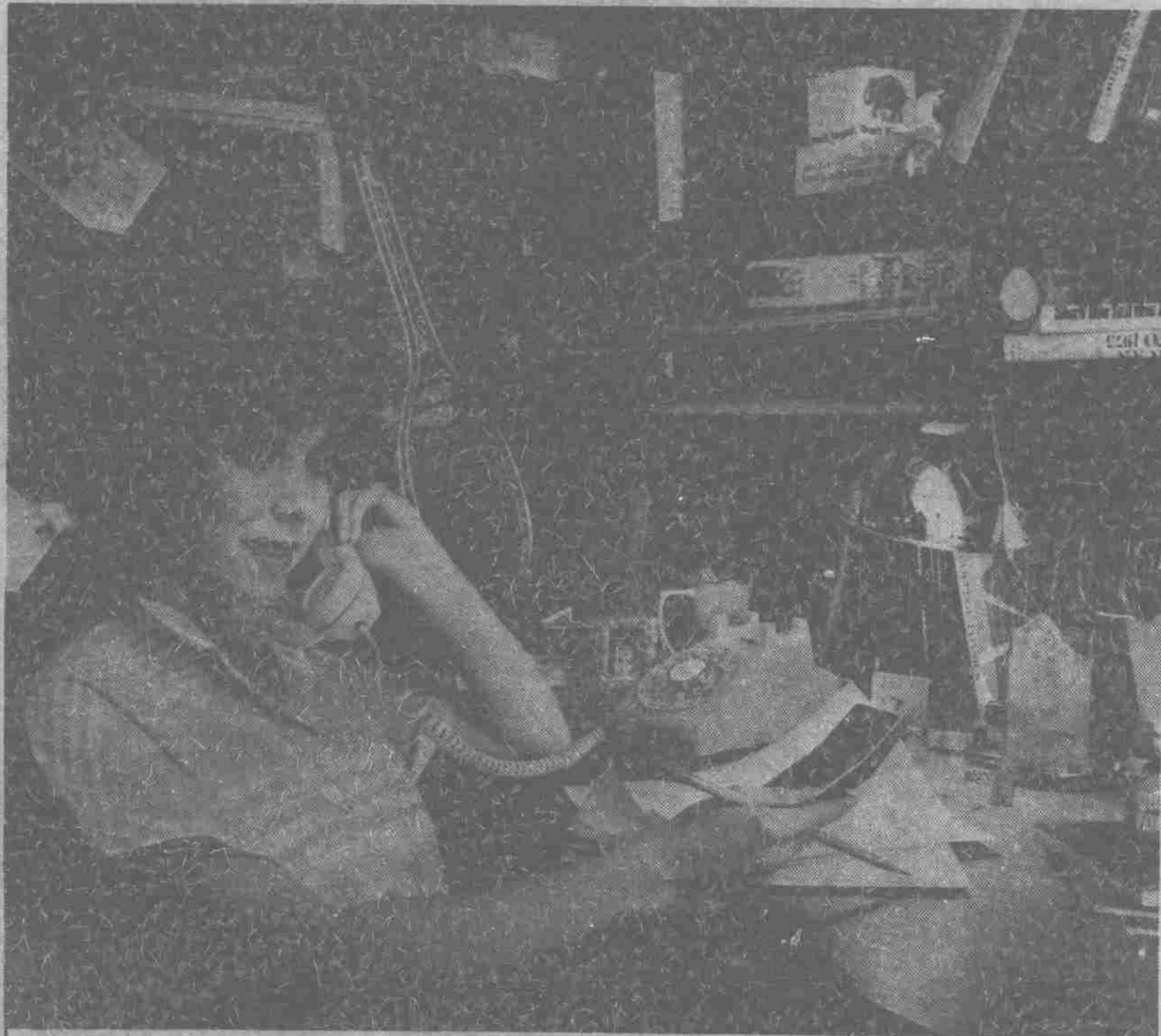
