Most of the lab's equipment, such as barometers and the thermometers to make sure the indoor temperature is always 75 degrees, has been specifi-cally designed for the lab.

Leviticus said the lab has "the most accurate equipment you can get anywhere."

People who drive on the west part of East Campus can see the second test, called drawbar. Drawbar, done on the outdoor track, tests a tractor's gear power and ability to lug things by pul-ling what looks like a small camping trailer around the track. Leviticus said this is the tough part of the testing process.

The lab also tests sound at this point. Sound measurements near the position of the driver's ear are taken and bystander sound measurements are done separately to determine the amount of noise 25 feet from the tractor's centerline.

After these tests are done, the tractor is reinspected to determine oil con-sumption and other factors, Leviticus said. The lab then completes reports and publishes them.

Since the test lab opened in 1920, it has tested more than 1,550 tractors from all over the world, Leviticus said. The lab can test about 40 tractors a

year — probably more if weather was test their equipment, he said.


College names faculty
