

Teachers College moves out

Teachers College administrators recently moved to new offices in Nebraska and Henzlik halls.

The Student Assistance Center, scheduled to open before the next school year, will occupy space in the Teachers College building.

"We were able to design things in Nebraska Hall the way we wanted

them, so it should work out good," said James O'Hanlon, Teachers College dean.

Although some faculty members are still in the Teachers College building, they plan to move next summer, O'Hanlon said. Before this summer, about half of the staff was at Nebraska Hall. Now, 10 percent of the staff, including the dean's office, is in Henzlik Hall. The rest have offices on the fifth floor of

Nebraska Hall. Because of its central location, Teachers College will contain all student services, O'Hanlon said. The building already houses the dean of students, vice chancellor for Student Affairs, director of Registration and Records and others. Other student services will move gradually, with some renovation planned.

Chapter wins service award

The UNL chapter of Phi Gamma Delta recently received a national award for excellence in religious, ethical and social services.

Mike Cassling, house president, said this was the first time the Nebraska chapter won the fraternity's international Baker Cup.

"We knew that our fraternity had a chance to win the Baker Cup," Cassling said.

The cup is awarded annually to fraternity chapters from the United States and Canada. The award, which is valued at \$22,000, is engraved with inscriptions dating back to 1918.

"It's worth \$22,000, but a lot more than that to us at the house," said Bob Parker, public relations co-chairman.

He said the fraternity had a full schedule of social activities last year.

The house sponsored an all-Greek non-alcoholic party, a pole-sit with Pi Beta Phi sorority, a bike trek and a blood drive. Cassling said fraternity members also attended church with members of Chi Omega sorority and participated in Honey Sunday and the Easter Seals Bunny Hop.

Plantasia, which the fraternity sponsored with Kappa Alpha Theta sorority, raised money for charity, as

did the efforts of house members who collected \$7,500 on Appreciation Day.

Public relations chairman Jeff Blumel said the fraternity also sponsored speakers for Campus Crusade for Christ at UNL.

Bob Parker, also public relations chairman for the house, said the fraternity plans to start a child search program, including dispersing leaflets nationwide.
