Special session called to balance state budget

Gov. Bob Kerrey called the Legislature back to Lincoln Friday for its second special session in four weeks to correct Nebraska's budget problems.

Senators will convene at 2 p.m. Thursday for a session that may last from two to six weeks, Kerrey said at a news conference. He said he will announce the specific subjects that the Legislature will consider this session at another news conference Tuesday.

The governor declined to reveal specific recommendations for finding about \$28 million to balance the budget. But he said his proposals would include

some tax hikes as well as across-the-board budget cuts and program eliminations. Kerrey said the tax proposals would not be "politically popular or easy."

Kerrey said he called the session for Thursday to give senators up to six weeks before Thanksgiving to complete their work. He said state senators whom he has talked to understand the session will take several weeks.

The Legislature met in special session Sept. 19-25 to approve a bill releasing \$8.5 million in state funds to depositors of the failed Commonwealth Savings Co. Senators will return to Lincoln for a regular 60-day session in January.
