Plans for the center began in 1978 when Milton I. Wick, class of 1922, gave challenges in the past and will con-

Gwathmey Siegel and Associates, a New York City firm, submitted the award winning building design in May 1981. Construction began a year later.

In 1983, George C. and Irene Mangold Holling of Omaha committed money for construction of a garden to the east of the center on 16th and R streets.

The center was finished in April 1985, and the garden was finished this month. The total cost of the building. furnishings and garden was \$3.6 mil-

In a closing statement, Rosenlof said the joy of having a new building for the 111-year-old Alumni Association is tampered by the grave economic situation facing NU. But he said the association has helped the university meet \$500,000 to NU to be matched by other tinue to do so in the future.


