

Lied demolition work will begin this month

A ceremonial demolition kicked off on the Lied Center for Performing Arts the work Jan. 6. The actual razing of the construction site should begin in two buildings will begin after preparations, to three weeks, said Bob Carpenter, such as disconnection of electrical wires and removal of asbestos from the buildings, are completed.

> The Lied Center will cost \$20 million to build, with \$10 million supplied by the Lied Foundation Trust of Las Vegas in honor of the late Omaha businessman Ernst Lied. Lied was an alumnus of UNL.

> The Legislature appropriated \$5 million for the effort. The NU Foundation has agreed to raise the remaining \$5 million and an additional \$5 million for the center's permanent maintenance.
