udget cuts restrict artifact care

A small crack traces down a monkey's skull. Two years worth of dust rests on the trunk of Morrill Hall's ancient fossils. Splits transverse priceless ivory tusks.

Morrill Hall, walked through the corridors of the museum, he pointed out damage in the hall, caused by a lack of climate control and adequate manpower to service the artifacts. The result, he said, of an 8 percent cut in the building's 1985-86 operating bud-

Janovy said it would take \$4 million to provide year-round temperature and humidity control. The system would provide optimum temperatures and humidity levels to preserve the fossils and exhibits in the building, he said.

Dusting the exhibits has been put off, Janovy said, to complete the museum's other projects where the damage is more immediate.

Some of the damage to the exhibits is irreparable, Janovy said.

For instance, he said, cracks on the outside of some of the stuffed animals show further damage underneath the

Also, painting backdrops behind the Nebraska wildlife exhibits in the basement of Morrill Hall are irreplacable, Janovy said. The paintings of Nebraska's plains were created by Francis Lee Jacques, who also painted similar As John Janovy, interim director of scenes for the Museum of Natural Art in New York.

"It's impossible to place a value on it (the paintings)," Janovy said. "We can't replace them. He's dead."

Janovy said the backdrops are also important because of their depiction of the state.

"Nebraska is a highly complex, rich, gorgeous place," Janovy said, "whe-reas the media has a perception of Nebraska as a desert."

Janovy said preserving the artifacts and ancient fossils also is important for the educational value of the museum.

"A kid can walk through it (the exhibits) and find out what Nebraska's about," Janovy said.



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
