Sordid, yuppie film 91/2 Weeks, another erotic obsession movie

This movie comes from Adrian Lyne, "Flashdance's" director. It shares the earlier film's impeccable sense of style and crystal clear production. "91/2 Weeks" also shares "Flashdance's" complete superficiality and predictability, without any of its charm or innocence.

The stars, Kim Basinger ("The Natural," "Never Say Never Again") and Mickey Rourke ("Rumble Fish," "Body Heat," "Diner") are the best things about this film. They look great together, and occasionally they even manage to generate some erotic heat on screen, but the screenplay never backs up their visual charisma.


