S.E. Copple out of jail

Commonwealth Savings Co., was released Monday from the Federal Correctional Institute here after serving nearly 10 months of his sentence, prison officials said.

Copple, 89, was sentenced to serve 12 to 14 months on a state charge of making a false entry in Commonwealth books and a concurrent 366-day federal sentence for making a false entry in the books of a Beatrice financial institution.

Israelis raid Palestinian camps
