

# Lincoln man, 19, is sentenced in false-imprisonment charge

A 19-year-old man, who on Feb. 11 allegedly ordered a female UNL student to take off her clothes and get into his car, has been convicted of first-degree false imprisonment, said Deputy County Attorney David Stempson.

Lawrence L. Gavre, 2525 Y St., was sentenced to nine months in jail.

At the time of the incident, police said the victim was confronted near 18th and R streets. She fled and called police about 11 p.m., an earlier Daily Nebraskan report said. Minutes later, UNL police spotted a car that matched the woman's description of the one driven by Gavre. Police stopped the car and arrested Gavre, who allegedly had a pellet gun.

Police commended the victim for being "quick witted" and getting a detailed description of the suspect and his car, the report said.

Bob Fey, crime prevention/investigation officer for the UNL police, said false imprisonment crimes do not often occur at UNL.

False imprisonment — knowingly restraining or abducting someone's movement — sometimes occurs in domestic affairs, Fey said, but it usually goes unreported.

If you find yourself in a similar situation, Fey suggests these tips:

- If confronted, try to get away from the threat. Act quickly.
- If possible, get an accurate des-

cription of the suspected abductor — clothing, height, skin color and special features, if any.

● Write down the license plate number of the vehicle, if one is involved, and try to get a description of it.

● Report the incident as quickly as possible. To call police, go to the nearest, safest place — a dormitory, a drug store or restaurant, Fey said.

### NDSL loans

5:31 a.m. — Vandalism reported to the Whittier Building. Plywood was pulled from windows but the building did not appear to have been entered.



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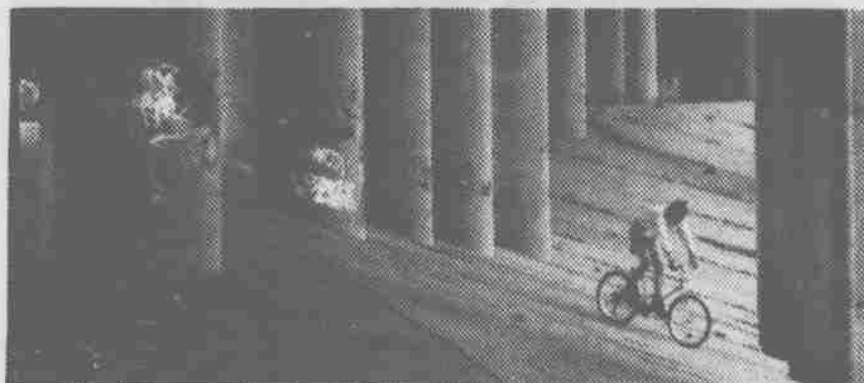
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
