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## NU official up for job

#### Griesen looking forward to new post

The associate vice chancellor of academic affairs said he wants to build relations between students and administration at UNL.

"There's no substitute to having face to face contact with student leaders," said James Griesen.



Griesen is being recommended by UNL Chancellor Martin Massengale to become interim vice chancellor for student affairs. He is expected to be confirmed to the NU Board of Regents at its October meeting. Griesen would assume the vice chancellor duties Oct.

"Obviously administration cannot speak with all 24,000 students, but it can keep an open dialogue between it and student leaders," Griesen said.

Griesen was named to the post to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of William Lewis, who was recently named vice president for university relations for NU.

Griesen has been associate vice chancellor for academic affairs at UNL since 1984. He also is UNL's director of summer sessions. As interim vice chancellor for student affairs, Griesen will oversee Academic Services, which includes registration, records, admissions and advising, student activities and financial aid.

In addition, Griesen will oversee the Student Center 4, an umbrella organization that covers the Academic Success Center, Multi-Cultural Affairs, the Counseling Center and General Studies and Advising. He will also oversee the directors of the University Health Center, the Nebraska unions, the Division of University Housing and the Judicial Affairs Office.

Griesen said it is important to create an environment in which students feel comfortable in asking faculty and administration for help.

"The best student affairs we can make here is one that when encountered by students, the staff will know how to help," Griesen said.

Griesen said that one of his goals as interim vice chancellor for student affairs is to make more effective use of the computerized information systems. Information systems help administration have effective management, he

Confusion occurred because the north end of the building, which was formerly called Teachers College, had room numbers that conflicted with those in the Administration Building.


numbers. Rooms in the basement of the Administration Building had three-digit numbers. On the first floor of the two buildings, some rooms had the same numbers.

# Residence halls protected

Student security officers watchdogs of UNL campuses

They don't wear two-way wristwatch radios like Dick Tracy, but they do provide security for more than 5,000 students.

Since 1972, 30 to 40 student officers and six student supervisors in UNL's Residence Hall Security Program have been providing building security and enforcing UNL housing rules for 10 residence halls and the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education.

The Residence Hall Security program is supervised by University

Each night before student officers begin their skills, they check in with their supervisors and gear up with radios, flashlights and master

Each student officer wears a brown uniform and budge. Often it's the uniform that many residents will

"Abuse is directed not towards the individual, but at the uniform," said Student Security Supervisor Shankar Shanmugam.

But if you realize that, it's not bad," Shanmugam said.

After the student officers have checked in, they proceed to a lineup room.

There the shift supervisor for the night informs student officers of new housing policies, times to lock residence halls and schedules for meetings and workshops.

After line-up, which usually ends by 11:30 p.m. the student officers depart for their residence halls. They remain in the halls until 4 a.m. (short shift), or 6 a.m. (long shift).

Student security officers and supervisors work assigned shifts for the rest of the semester. When residence halls are closed during the semester break, student security supervisors check the empty buildings. The program also provides security for UNL summer housing and residence halls that have been rented out to special groups for conventions during the summer.

Because of visa stipulations, foreign students can only work twenty hours a week during the school year, and only on campus.

A student security officer also is pested in the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education, a convention center and hotel on East Campus.

Between 40 to 45 percent of the students working for the Residence Hall Security Program are from other

countries.
Lt. Ken Cauble of the University police said the residence hall security program is valuable to campus security. Student security officers are responsible for locking up residence halls at 1 a.m. Their other duties include enforcing UNL Housing visitation policies, which prohibit visits by members of the opposite sox in all residence halls after !

One night, seme officers mare. kept busy enforcing the policy. At 12:55 a.m. in Sandoz Hall lobby. Soom Ang sald, "I haven't rested my gab since I first got to my lobby."

Ang continually reminded male visitors about the policy which allows no males above the lobby floor in a female residence hall without an escort from the hall.

One student wondered about the security officer's uniform.

"Do you carry any guns?" he "We're going to carry water pis-

tols real soon," Ang said. But there was little activity in the lobbies of Burr and Fedde halls on

East Campus. Student security officer Daye Hrdy said he likes working at Fedde. The plush lobby, no larger than a large

living room, was deserted. At such

times he is free to study, he said. "I'm writing a book about my life," Hrdy said.
