

Sports Champions celebrate

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Snowballs and confetti, rather than ticker-tape, hailed the Super Bowl champion New York Giants as they returned to their stadium Tuesday to celebrate their first NFL championship in 31 years.

More than 30,000 braved 10-degree temperatures for the festivities, which team officials decided to have at Giants Stadium after a controversy developed whether to give the club New York's traditional heroes' parade through the canyons of downtown Manhattan.

The frigid weather limited the crowd. Organizers had prepared for 125,000 people, raising \$650,000 from private donations, ordering 100,000 kazoos and stuffing bags with pompons, buttons and confetti.

The first diehard fans, thinking they would have to compete for seats, spent the night in the icy parking lot. More gathered at dawn, lighting bonfires and cooking tailgate breakfasts.

Those who were there got what they came for.

"I have a little something to show you," Coach Bill Parcells said as he held up the silver Vince Lombardi Trophy earned for the team's 39-20 victory over the Denver Broncos Sunday.

Parcells was showered with confetti from a Gatorade bucket, symbolic of the soft-drink shower he received after most Giants victories.

"I hope that sometime in the near future we can all get together and do this again," said quarterback Phil Simms, the Super Bowl MVP who joined his teammates on the stage to receive gold medallions from New Jersey Gov. Thomas H. Kean.

Fans provided some of their own entertainment, chanting "We're No. 1," singing "We Are The Champions" and "Go Giants Go" and getting into wild

snowball fights.

About 100 National Guardsmen were called in to guard the snow piles on the field, and several people were escorted out of the stadium. There were no arrests.

"The Giants are the first world champions from the state of New Jersey," said Kean.

He added that "the Giants are a team which knows no formal boundaries," but there was no doubt the fans rejected any claims by New York City, where Mayor Ed Koch at first snubbed

the team by refusing a ticker-tape victory parade.

Koch, vacationing in Poland, compounded the insult this week when he called the official Giants Stadium celebration "practice" and kept open an offer for a corporation-sponsored parade down Broadway.

The only dignitary from the New York side of the Hudson River on hand Tuesday was New York City Council President Andrew Stein, who could barely get out a "New York loves New Jersey" before boos and a few snowballs chased him off the stage.

Sophomore hopes to fill exiting Miller's shoes

In the last three years, senior Angie Miller has dominated the center position on the Nebraska women's basketball team. Next year, however, Miller will graduate, and sophomore Wendy Kriebel said she feels she'll be ready to continue building a tradition for the Cornhuskers.

Kriebel, a 6-3 sophomore from Benton, Pa., said she's ready to continue where Miller leaves off.

"I'm ready to get more playing time," Kriebel said. "I want to be a big factor on the team next year."

Although limited in her time on the court this season, Kriebel said she still feels she's contributing to the team's success in an important way.

"I see my role as helping the starters get prepared for the opposition," she said. "I try to challenge them before a game and give them as much support as I can."

This season has been her second in an important learning role. She said playing with someone as talented as Miller has been a great experience for her. Her teammates' and coaches' support has made the adjustment to college level basketball much easier, she said.

Coming from a small high school without a weight-training program for its female athletes, Kriebel said Nebraska's weight room was a new experience for her.

"I was shocked," she said. "I had never thought about lifting weights before."

Kriebel says she needs to build her strength with weights to become competitive with stronger centers next year. Becoming more physical will improve her offensive output, she said.

As a whole, Kriebel feels that this year's team under new Coach Angela Beck is more disciplined and more unified. She says the improvements Beck has taught her in defense will make the difference in a starting

role next year.

Replacing Miller, a three-year starter and Nebraska's No. 5 all-time scorer, is a difficult task at best. However, Kriebel feels that doing just that is within her abilities.

"It's going to be hard to fill her shoes," she said, "but I want to try to be as good as she is."

It's not so super

NEW YORK — CBS's telecast of the Super Bowl received a disappointing 45.8 rating and 66 share across the country, making it the lowest-rated Super Bowl since 1981.

"The numbers are not as high as we thought they would be," said Linda Levens, associate director of program analysis for CBS Sports.

Sunday's game between the New York Giants and Denver Broncos drew a 47.8 rating and 68 share in 13 major markets, but the ratings were much lower in the rest of the country.

Levens said neither team apparently had the national appeal that the Chicago Bears displayed in their previous Super Bowl, which received a 48.3 rating and 70 share.

CBS had estimated that 130 million viewers would watch this year's Super Bowl. The network now estimates that the audience was 122.6 million, which would be the second-

largest in Super Bowl history behind the Bears-New England Patriots game in 1986.

Some higher-rated Super Bowls had smaller viewing audiences because there were fewer television sets when those games were played. The rating measures the percentage of the nation's 87.4 million television homes watching a program.

Levens said the viewing audience for this year's Super Bowl declined in the second half as the Giants pulled away to a 39-20 victory. The three previous Super Bowls were also lopsided, but they all drew higher ratings.

The highest-rated Super Bowl in history was the 1982 game between San Francisco and Cincinnati. The CBS telecast of that game received a 49.1 rating and 73 share.

The Giants-Broncos game drew the lowest rating of any Super Bowl since the Oakland Raiders played the Philadelphia Eagles in 1981. That game, which was televised by NBC, drew a 44 rating and 63 share.
