# Jefferson meeting examines malleability of Constitution

The U.S. Constitution was one of the first government documents that included a way to change it, said the keynote speaker at the Jefferson Meeting on the Constitution Friday.

The Thomas Jefferson, who was one of the main sponsors of instituting a way to change the Constitution, preferred changing it through congressional amendments and Constitutional conventions called by the public, said Dr. Merrill D. Peterson, Thomas Jefferson Foundation Professor at the University of Virginia.

But judicial review has become the main process of changing the Constitution because the many groups involved in politics today find it hard to collaborate, Peterson said.

The delegates participating in the meeting Friday and Saturday debated the topics of elimination of the electoral college, establishmentof a single six-year term for the

House of Representatives. Professor Jan Vermeer, head of the political science department at Nebraska Wesleyan University, said Judicial review makes the courts the Constitution's guardian. This can make it more difficult for citizens to help change the constitution, he

said. The convention stresses the notion of constituent involvement, Vermeer said. It is based on citizens deciding on the elements of the Constitution, Vermeer said.

The constitution should be constantly reexamined, Vermeer said. Even Jefferson's belief that the Constitution should be re-evaluated every 19 or 20 years is a good idea, Vermeer said.

The meeting at the Nebraska Center for Continuing Education Friday and Saturday was part of a nationwide effort to reevaluate the Constitution and increase awareness of it. Around 20 observers attended from other states where Jefferson meetings are being planned.


