Ashe has taken the ancient accounts of Arthur (chiefly the famous history by 12-century monk Geoffrey of Monmouth), stripped them of fancy to leave only plausible historical events, and then searched for a real person whose life met those criteria.

This is not conventional historical scholarship. It's vastly more entertaining, for one thing. Ashe uses a wild form of commando scho-

larship when he leaps wildly for an attractive conclusion and then goes about collecting premises to support it. But the book is not a flim-flam job, Ashe always lets us know when he's breaking the rules and why. And even with its irregularities taken into account, his argument still stands remarkably well.

Ashe painstakingly constructs his argument so that we are not told who his historical Arthur is until more than halfway through the book.

"The Discovery of King Arthur" holds all the fascination of a well constructed whodunit.

The remainder of the book is devoted to how Arthur's myth grew, how we came to view him as we do and why he holds such an important place in our collective soul.

"The Discovery of King Arthur" is more than an entertaining exercise in popular history, it is a revealing glimpse into why and how we are what we are.

This comedy surveys the lives of three women. In 1963, Joanne, Kathy and Mary are aggressively vivacious cheerleaders. Five years later, in their college sorority house, they are confronting their futures with

nervous jauntiness. In 1974, they reunite briefly in New York. Their lives have diverged, but the women try to recreate their camaraderie of years past. The humor is bittersweet and unnervingly funny.

Direction is by Jack Parkhurst, whose directing credits include
