NU baseball player tries regaining form

Jeff Taylor is still trying to regain his form after three years away from the diamond.

Taylor, from Omaha Westside High School, announced before he graduated in 1983 that he would be up for recruitment as a football quarterback. Nebraska, Oklahoma, Iowa State, Wyoming and Houston expressed interest in Taylor before he finally decided to play for the Cornhuskers.

However, when players like Clete Blakeman and Steve Taylor made their presence known on the team, Taylor didn't feel he was seeing enough playing time. Last year, he decided to move to the baseball team, and he hasn't regretted the decision yet.

Taylor said the technique involved in pitching and fielding came back easily, but it has taken him time to regain his talent as a hitter.

"I still haven't gotten my timing back at the plate," Taylor said. "I've been spending a little extra time in batting practice to get it back."

In 1986, Taylor started 31 of 34 games for the Huskers, 23 at first base and the rest as a left-hander on the pitcher's mound.

At the plate Taylor hit five doubles, two triples and three home runs for an average of .241 with 25 runs batted in. As a fielder, he committed only one error in 47 games for a .996 percentage.

football, baseball and basketball. Taylor hit .464 as a junior and .382 as a senior. He also posted a 1.35 ERA and a 6-1 record during his final season at Westside. In 1983, he was named the Omaha World-Herald's male high-school athlete of the year.



Nebraska's women have won seven consecutive outdoor titles in the Big Eight, and Szarkowski wants to keep that string alive.

"I think as a team we are once again going to try to win another Big Eight title," Szarkowski said.





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
