Harz Marketing and Promotions Inc. and midAmerican Long Distance Co. filed lawsuits last week in which each alleges that the other hasn't because of promotional agreements abided by the terms of the contract.

According to the lawsuits, Harz Marketing had contracts with Osborne. Fry and Grant permitted the company to arrange personal appearances by the coaches on behalf of Harz's clients. The lawsuits don't disclose what Harz had agreed to pay the coaches.
