

King's birthday observed

Orr presentation, motorcade, lunch to honor leader

Several Lincoln and University of Nebraska-Lincoln groups will celebrate Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday.

Gov. Kay Orr will be in the Capitol Rotunda today at noon to deliver brief remarks on Monday's holiday.

The Malone Community Center, 2032 U St., is sponsoring a police-escorted motorcade after Orr's presentation. Participants will begin the drive on the north side of the Capitol and finish at the Malone Center, where a luncheon will be given. A speaker will read King's speech, "I Have a Dream."

Barbara L. Kelley, community services coordinator for the Malone Center, said the cold weather and the high number of elderly people expected for the event ruled out a march from the Capitol, so the center decided on a motorcade.

The University Program Council's Black Special Events Committee and with the Afrikan People's Union will sponsor a symposium in celebration of King's birthday at the Culture Center, 333 N. 14th St., at

6 p.m. Monday.

Panelists Gerald Henderson, equal opportunity officer of Lincoln; Buddy Hogan, representative for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in Omaha; Lawrence Meyers, executive director of the Nebraska Equal Opportunity Commission; Brad Munn, affirmative action/equal opportunity officer at UNL; and possibly state Sen. Ernie Chambers will discuss their views on the civil rights movement and answer questions.

In addition, the APU Gospel Choir will perform at the Culture Center on King's birthday.

After the symposium, participants are encouraged to attend a candle-lit walk to the Capitol. A prayer in honor of King will be said, and a speaker will talk about how King's dream is alive today.

Tonya Horn, chairperson of the UPC's Black Special Events Committee, said she thinks the symposium and walk to the Capitol are important because "a lot of today's students don't know a lot about Martin Luther King."

RHA amends judicial bylaw

The University of Nebraska-Lincoln Residence Hall Association senators amended passages of a bylaw that would govern the Judicial Board Thursday night.

Currently no written record of Residence Hall judicial procedures exists.

Russ Johnson, RHA president, said questions have been raised about who controls the Judicial Board.

"In the past there were questions concerning who controls the Judicial Board, whether it was the Housing Administration or the RHA Senate," Johnson said.

"There were no specific procedures of the Board written up," he said.

Senators discussed and amended several portions of the drafted bylaw, but the review

will continue at the next meeting Jan. 21.

The RHA Committee of Procedure and Practice started the task of compiling the Judicial Procedures last August to provide the permanent bylaw to the RHA constitution.

Residents who become involved with the Judicial Board process through disciplinary actions or appeals have the right to know these procedures according to the laws of due process, Johnson said.

Charles Strey, Coordinator of Residence Hall Administration, who serves as the RHA Judicial Board Advisor, said he was working on flyers to be sent to residents explaining the role of the Judicial Board.

Powers of the Judicial Board include disciplinary action, impeachment of RHA senators, and interpretation of the constitution, much the same as that of the courts of the United States, Johnson said.
