Staff Reporter When Stanford finished third at the 1986 NCAA Men's Gymnastics Championships in Lincoln, it surprised many people - even Cardinal coach Sadao Hamada.

But at this year's NCAA Championships April 14-16 at the Bob Devaney Sports Center, Hamada said, it should come as no surprise that the Cardinal has their sights on winning their first NCAA Gymnastics Championship in school history.

Hamada said the reason for his optimism is that Stanford, 20-5 and ranked sixth in the NCAA poll with a 282.26 scoring average, finished second to defending NCAA Champion UCLA at the Pacific Ten Championships last weekend in Los Angeles.

Hamada said Stanford also has a shot at winning the NCAA championship because of seniors Randy Besosa, Mike Matzek and Chuck Gerardo. Besosa's highest score in the allaround competition this season is 58.05, while Matzek and Gerardo have tallied 57.7 and 57.5 scores.
