

Chabon's first novel is an exception to the rule

First novels always have to overcome a tricky obstacle. They must

not only introduce an author to the world, but also establish the author's first work as something apart from the other masses of books littering the store display. Debut novels usually come across as an odd mixture of roughness and substance while the author tries to find his or her voice.

Book Review

Michael Chabon's first novel, "The Mysteries of Pittsburgh" (Morrow, \$16.95), is the exception to the rule. From the moment the novel opens, Chabon, a recent graduate of the universities of Pitts-burgh and California at Irvine, catches the reader in a consistently smooth web of words that seemingly flows on and on while controlling all unnecessary details.

Chabon's narrator is Art Bechstein, just-graduated economics major at the University of Pittsburgh and son of an educated mobster. He's at the end of both his undergraduate career and a yearlong affair with his eccentric girl-


