"If you want anything, work for it," Speights said. "If you go to jail taught herself to read before she went you can work for the state, but you can never own the state. So work for

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
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Evelyn Speights carves a radish into a flower. Speights makes flower-shaped garnishes from vegetables to decorate the Harvest Room

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
