The Lincoln YWCA has added a program to help the Fire Department recruit "a more multicultural squad," said Luann Larsen, YWCA career counselor and coordinator of the firefighter training program. The Lincoln YWCA is offering

classes to train women and minorities to become firefighters. Larsen said the eight-week session will prepare participants for the firefighter exam, which takes place in August and September.

'We are specifically targeting women for the program, but it isn't limited to just women," Larsen said. 'Anyone can come.'

The sessions will include fitness training three times a week, tutoring for the firefighter exam, a weekly support and counseling group, and workshops on job stress and interview techniques. The fitness classes will focus on upper-body strength, Larsen said.

Terry Biggerstaff, administrative officer for the Lincoln Fire Department, said Lincoln has two women firefighters on the force.

"There are a lot of them across the country now, and they are able to perform their duties just like everybody else," Biggerstaff said. The Lincoln Fire Department also employs five minority firefighters, he
