Triangle apologizes

A Triangle fraternity newsletter printed an apology for a member's alleged involvement in the making of a mock newsletter that ridiculed homosexuals.

The mock newsletter, entitled the "Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Avacados (sic)," was distributed on the UNL campus in early March.

The Big Red Telegraph, Triangle's newsletter, apologized for the newsletter, saying the "SPCA in no way represents the views of the Nebraska Chapter of Triangle and is, in fact, largely the efforts of

a single brother." UNL Triangle President Greg Imig said the apology should not have been printed because there is no proof that the Triangle member was involved.

"I confronted this person and he denied (making the newslet-ter)," Imig said.

Hamilton explosion

ton Hall slightly injured a UNL graduate student and spewed radiation and a dangerous chemical throughout a lab on the seventh floor.

The explosion occurred July 12 at 2:30 a.m. and caused glass slivers to cut graduate student Sheng Shijie's chin. Sheng was pouring a highly reactive chemical into a beaker when the explosion occurred.

George Sturgeon, vice chair-man of the chemistry department, said the chemical that caused the explosion, diazomethane, is very touchy and unpredictable.

The chemical and radiation from carbon-14 contaminated Sheng's clothes, lab apron and her hair. Her hair had to be cut because the chemical had bonded to it.

After the explosion, Sheng ran to the bathroom, contaminating it and the hall.

Larry Grimm, UNL radiation safety officer, said carbon-14 doesn't emit much radiation. He said UNL environmental officials cleaned up the mess in the bathroom and the hall.

Grimm said the officials have been too busy to clean the lab, but he plans to have it cleaned some time this week.

Transferable tickets

Football tickets will become transferable under a plan an-nounced by the UNL athletic department.

Under the new plan, students can give their tickets to other fulltime students. Students with borrowed tickets will enter a special gate where their full-time status will be verified.

James Griesen, vice chancellor for student affairs, said students borrowing tickets can use either the photo or the non-photo IDs. UNL is in the process of implementing a photo ID system.

Students also can give tickets to non-students, who must pay the \$11.50 difference between the student and general admission price. For the Nebraska-Oklahoma game, non-student ticket borrowers will pay an \$18.50 difference.

Joe Selig, ticket manager at UNL, said the student ticket holder, not the borrower, must pay the difference at the ticket office during specified days and times.

Those days are Wednesday and Thursday before the game in question from 9 a.m to noon and 1 to 4 p.m. and 9 to 11 a.m. on game day.

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
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
