Thursday, Ian Moore and Moments Notice will play at the Zoo Bar. About every ten years or so, a young blues guitarist from Texas shakes up the music world with a new and exciting blues/rock sound.

Last time, it was Stevie Ray Vaughn in 1982 and '83. Many music critics predict that Moore will be the next Texas wonder boy to redefine the blues/rock sound. And he's playing at the Zoo Bar. Robert Cray is the last performer who played the Zoo Bar to be widely acclaimed nationally. If not for Ian Moore and Moments' gutsy, soul-invigorating music, at least go and see history in the making.

Also Thursday, Preston Love will play smooth jazz standards at Julio's, 132 S. 13th St.

Friday and Saturday, the Mannish Boys will play at the Zoo Bar.

Monday, the Tablerockers will play at the Zoo Bar.

Tuesday, Triple Play will play at the Zoo Bar. Triple Play performs an energetic blend of swing, country and blues standards. The band was known as B and the Hot Notes until lead singer Beth McBride left. Triple Play still manages some two-part harmonies without her, however.

Rock:
Friday, Owen Munchie and the Debtors will play at the Mountains Bar and Grill, 311 S. 11th St.
Friday and Saturday, the Limit will play at Chesterfield's, Lower Level 245 N. 13th St. The Limit plays good, clean, light-hearted, dance-oriented pop music. One of Lincoln's most popular cover bands, the Limit also is branching out into performing some originals.

Saturday, Bobby Curious will play at Bash Riprocks, Upper Level 238 N. 12th St. Bobby is developing quite a reputation as a showman for his unusual behavior on stage. The number of people that come to hear Bobby Curious play week after week should indicate something about the band's ability to entertain. Bobby Curious plays mostly cover tunes, but some originals.
