control over budget requests made to the Legislature, said Sen. Jerome Warner, committee co-chairman from Waverly.

Regents would report to the Legislature and governor in the biennial budget process on the performances of the universities, state colleges and technical community colleges.

The regents also would monitor the roles and missions of the colleges and universities.

The board would allocate state funds and create general policies for personnel, admission requirements and tuition levels. The Legislature, however, would appropriate funds directly to each institution.

The bill would abolish the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Post-secondary Education and create the Nebraska Higher Education Commission.

A private citizen appointed by the governor would serve as chairperson of the commission, and the board of regents would appoint three of its members for staggered three-year terms.

Three members of technical community college boards and two members on the governing boards of private colleges and universities also would be appointed to the board.

Three other commission members would be an owner, shareholder or board member of a Nebraska private

vocational school, the governor and the commissioner of education.

Two legislators would sit on the commission as nonvoting members.

The bill states that the commission would be a "statewide forum for the consideration of post-secondary educational issues."

The commission also would assist the board of regents in developing a strategic plan for education. The commission would administer the State Scholarship Award Program Act, the Scholarship Assistance Program and any other state-administered financial aid program.

To enact the restructuring of higher education, a transition committee would be established for one year.

Members making up the committee would come from the public, university and college administrations, the Nebraska Coordinating Commission for Post-secondary Education, the technical community college administration, the Department of Administrative Services and its budget division.

The firm had advised, however, that members of the Legislature sit as voting members on the Higher Education Commission. Because the commission would administer financial aid funds, the senators' role was changed to advisory.

Withem said the bill has yet to be assigned, but probably will go to the Education Committee, of which he

is chairman.

The bill does not give the student member of the boards of trustees voting power, but Warner said he is sure it will be an issue.

He said he would not support a proposal giving students an official vote.

Warner said he thinks the bill gives the proposed board of regents for Nebraska Higher Education adequate power because it has the authority to submit budgets and to lobby the Legislature.

"It gives them a lot," Warner said. "You cannot have coordination without those authorities."
