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also said he thought senators should move on to other bills.

Hefner said he supports parental notification in the case of abortion because notification is required for less important matters, such as ear-piercing or school officials giving aspirin to students.

Abortion is at least as important as ear-piercing, he said.

"I think we need to get our priorities in order," Hefner said.

Later, Sen. David Landis of Lincoln said parental notification of ear-piercing and distributing aspirin isn't required by state statutes.

And those parental notification questions are not comparable to abortion, Landis said.

"This is unlike any other law," Landis said.

Chambers later criticized the bill because he said it attempts to impose "a certain religious view on everybody."

"This bill is arrogant," Chambers said. "It is so unfair."

Sen. David Bernard-Stevens of North Platte compared the division of senators to battles between gladiators in ancient Rome.

Both sides know it's a fight to the death, he said.

Committee urged to grant increased UPC requests

To ensure that University Program Council activities reach the most students, executive director Julie Sherbeck on Thursday urged CFA members to grant the 21 percent increase UPC has requested.

The Committee for Fees Allocation heard the second half of UPC's 1990-91 budget request, which would cost each student \$4.58.

The Dances and Cornstock Committee of UPC East requested a \$1,483 increase in its budget.

Joe Thelen, UPC East president, said the increase is necessary to offset costs involved with moving Cornstock to its new site.

'Peeping Toms' escape penalty; committee votes to kill bill

Members of the Legislature's Judiciary Committee worked to uncover the definition of the word "peep" Thursday afternoon.

Legislators were sorting through language in a bill that would have made "Peeping Toms" subject to criminal penalties.

The committee voted 7-1 to kill the bill after several committee members said the bill would be too difficult to clarify.

Mary Campbell, speaking on behalf of Sen. Rod Johnson, of Sutton, introducer of the bill, said the proposal is needed because of an incident that occurred in the Grand Island area recently.

Campbell said a tanning salon owner was found photographing patrons in the nude.

The county attorney had difficulty bringing suit because the state does not have a statute to prosecute such cases, she said.

James Cavanaugh, lobbyist for the Nebraska Criminal Defense Attorneys, tried to clear up the "peeping" language by quoting Webster's Dictionary definition of "peeper."

According to Webster's, Cavanaugh said, "a peeper is defined as one who makes a peeping sound."

Before finally concluding his testimony against the bill, Cavanaugh said, "I'll just say a couple of more words and you won't hear another peep out of me."
