Daily Nebraskan inebacker duo called best by coach

Mike Petko has a new license plate and is looking to run someone over.

Petko, who wore number 37 last year, will wear number 99 this fall and feels much better about it. "When you think of 37, you don't

think of, you know, strength," said the junior from Anaheim, Calif. 'Ninety-nine makes you think of ... like the front of a runaway car.

While Petko still is speaking in terms of things out of control, that no longer reflects his style of play, ac-cording to linebacker coach Kevin

"I probably preferred it like it was before," said the 6-foot-2, 240-poun-der from Omaha. "Now people know who you are.'

Tyrance also must mix studies with spending time with his wife, Renita,

and son, Pat III, born last winter. "It's not easy," he said. "We are here to get a degree, but people don't realize how hard that can be.

Petko, who missed two games in 1989 with a knee injury, said the knee isn't perfect, but shouldn't hamper

to be like that for the rest of my life.

What could be a factor is the inexperience behind Petko and Tyrance. But even that can be deceiving, Steele said.
