The Pistons have claimed two consecutive NBA titles, and they kicked off their title defense Friday with a 110-95 victory over the Los Angeles Clippers in an exhibition game at the Bob Devaney Sports Center.

Detroit center Bill Laimbeer said

After we won the first one, the mental block was gone," Laimbeer said. "Now the challenge is to be physically prepared and take every game seriously.


He added that he doesn't refer to himself or the Pistons as 'Bad Boys' We just call ourselves world
