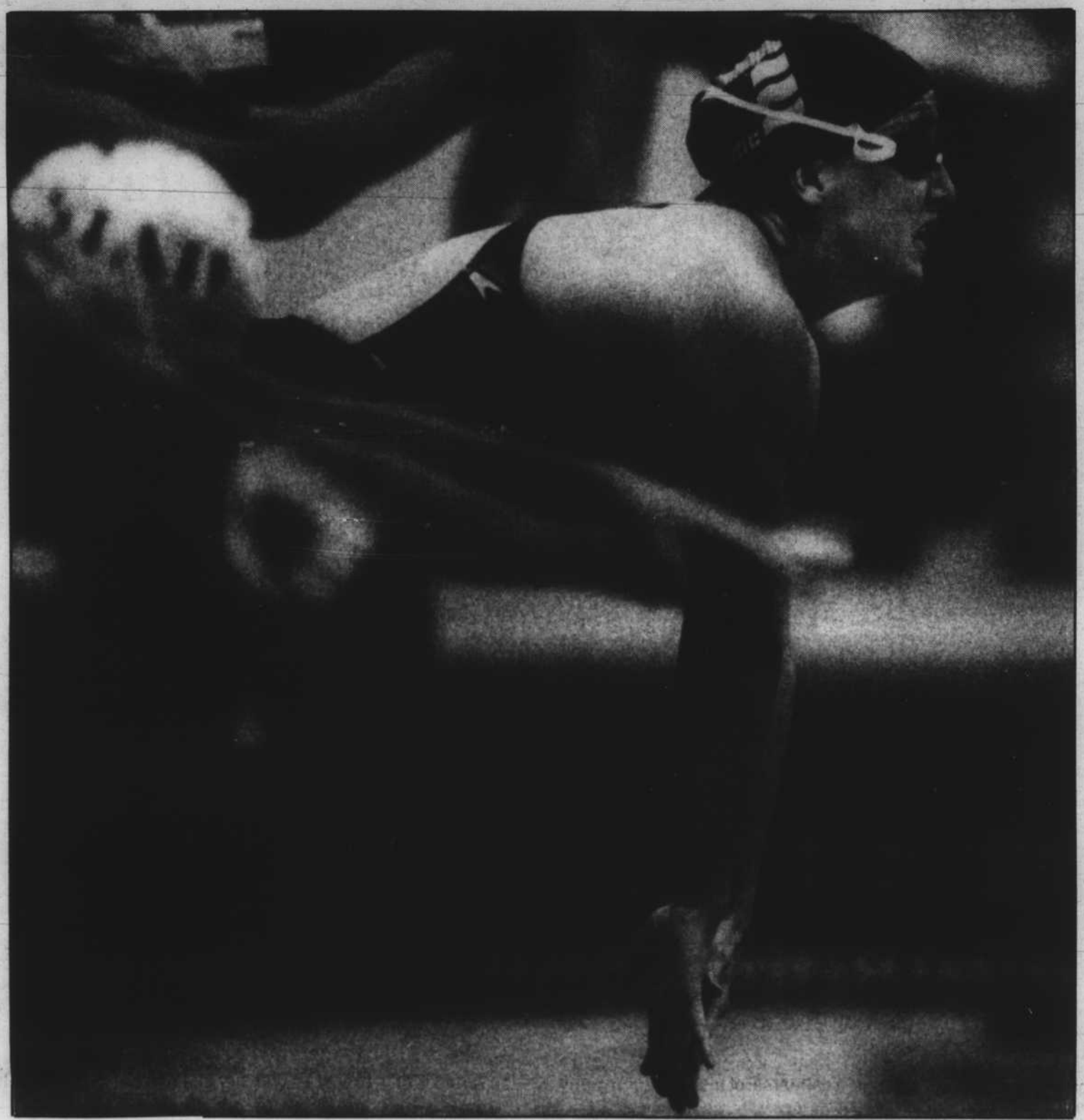

Rainbolt said that Travis' team-

mate, Denise Lucas is the top returning 200-meter runner in the nation at this point. So far this season, Travis has finished just ahead of Lucas.

"Denise is running very well so far this season," Rainbolt said. "She and Kathy should battle it out all year."

Looking beyond these big collegiate meets, Travis has another goal.

"My dream is to go to the Olympics some day," she said. "I'm satisfied with where I'm at right now, but I'll always have the desire to get better."

"It will come with practice," Travis said.

When the outdoor season begins, Travis plans to run the 100, 200 and 400-relay. But, Rainbolt said, Nebraska has a couple of home meets left, and he urged people to come out and see Travis run.

"People should grasp any opportunity they have to come and see Kathy run," Rainbolt said. "I'm not sure people realize what we've got here. She is really something."
