"That hole-in-one cost me about \$30," he said. "I had to buy everybody a round when I went back to the clubhouse. That's the tradition.






Manton said he was supposed to get a some recognition from the National Hole-In-One Club but never received it.

and a little luck for it to roll in," he said.










